Notes for Contributors

Detailed instructions for contributors are available at journals.cambridge.org. In brief:

- 1. Manuscripts should not exceed 10,000 words (or equivalent). Shorter pieces and squibs are welcome.
- 2. Authors should submit to the appropriate editor an electronic copy of the paper, preferably in Microsoft Word DOC format. The name(s) of the author(s) and full contact details should be on a separate page at the start of the document. Occasionally, an author may be asked to send a paper copy of the manuscript by post or a PDF version as well.

 3. If an accepted manuscript departs significantly from the style specified below, the contributor may be asked to reformat
- Authors of accepted articles will be asked to assign copyright, on certain conditions, to Cambridge University Press. In lieu of offprints, contributors will be supplied with a PDF file of their contribution upon publication.
