## *Contributors*

Wherever possible, articles should be submitted on disc or by email in both .doc and .pdf format. Please leave any formatting to a minimum; your hard copy will be marked up by the editors to conform with house style. Illustrations should be submitted by email, file transfer or on CD in JPEG or TIFF format at a minimum of 300 dpi, or as clear prints of photographs or strong outline drawings in ink. Laser-quality print-outs of complicated computer-generated tables or graphics would be appreciated.

Abbreviations follow those currently accepted in the journals *Orientalia* and *Archiv für Orientforschung*. Be sure to include the following as end-matter: (a) a full list of references or a bibliography, (b) an abstract of about 100 words suitable for translation into Arabic, and (c) your address and email for academic purposes.
