limited to 888 prints. The printing plates have been personally destroyed by the artist.

'African Violets' has been printed on acid-free 200 gsm. Silk art paper using British Standard inks. It is reproduced actual size, including a border, at 450cm x 640cm, (17 3/4" x 25 1/4").

The price of £56 is fully inclusive of recorded delivery, in mainland Britain, and a certificate of authenticity will be issued with each print.

The Artist

Jonathan Kingdon worked and taught in East Africa until 1974 since when he has been based in Oxford. Using a wide range of media he celebrates the natural world.

'A rare thing' he says, 'embodies both the fragility of existence and the uniqueness of all life, so when a single locality supports large numbers of rare species, both our concern and the need for explanations acquire an intense focus.'

His work has been purchased by the British Museum (N.H.), Ashmolean Museum, Senckenberg Museum and by private collectors worldwide. The BBC TV films 'From Aardvark to Zebra, a Kilimanjaro Sketchbook and Masked Monkeys' explored his work.

Major works range from stained glass windows, ceramics and notable publications all celebrating wildlife in every form whilst recognising their fragile existence within our world.
