

# Peter in the New Testament

edited by Raymond E. Brown,  
Karl P. Donfried and John Reumann

The role of Peter has remained one of the most sensitive and widely discussed areas of New Testament inquiry, particularly because of its implications for the position of the Papacy in the Christian world. This collaborative assessment by a group of notable Roman Catholic and Protestant scholars, working under ecumenical sponsorship, is the result of two years' examination of this most important subject in the light of modern biblical knowledge and criticism.

The results of their joint discussion are clearly presented in a form that is acceptable both to the interested reader and to the student; they are significant both in terms of what can be known with assurance about the historical career of Peter, and with regard to the development of the image of Peter after his death.

Peter in the New Testament has biblical, theological and ecumenical implications for all Christians – original, scholarly and thoughtful, it is a unique contribution to New Testament studies.
