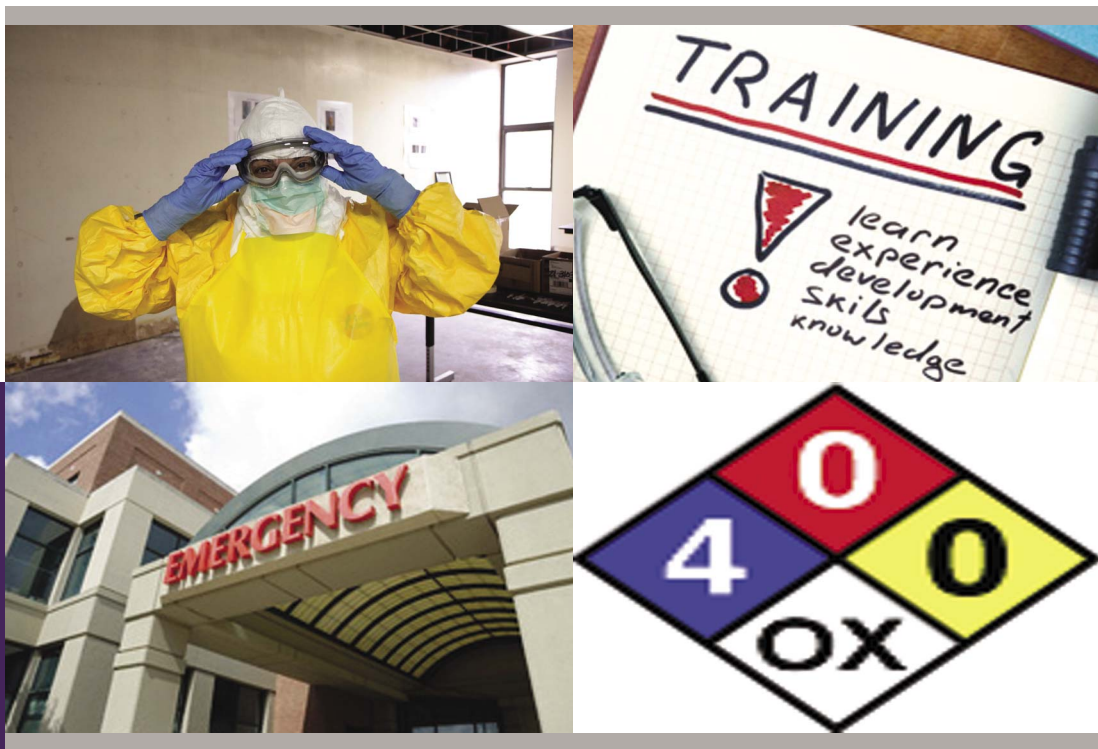

Medical Reserve Corps

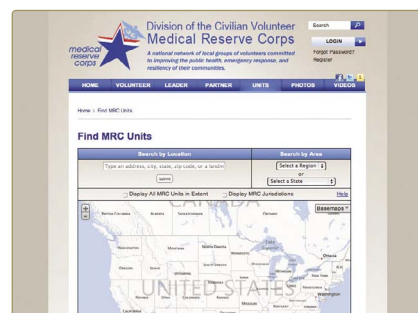
