## ROYAL IRISH ACADEMY

### Eoin O'Mahony Bursary in Irish History

Applications are invited for the annual Eoin O'Mahony Bursary award. The bursary was established from funds donated by friends of the late Eoin O'Mahony, and supplemented by a bequest from the estate of Barry and Wanda Petronella Brown, to assist scholars undertaking research on historical subjects of Irish interest by providing a grant towards the cost of consulting foreign sources. The annual value of the award is approximately IR£1,000.

Previous awards have been made for archive searches in Spain on the life of General Count Daniel O'Mahony; for research on the history of maritime relations between Ireland and Portugal; for a study of the Irish in Flanders at the turn of the 17th century; for research on the Ó Cléirigh, O'Byrne, Allen, O'Madden, Vallis and Napper families in Europe, and on the Irish ancestry of General de Gaulle; and for studies of the lives of Bishop Count Edourd O'Rourke and William Putnam McCabe.

Preference will be given to projects concerning family history, in particular those which are associated with the 'wild geese'. Particular consideration will be given to those who have been active in local learned societies.

Applications must be returned by **31st January** in each year.
