

If the clergy would follow the example of popular preachers and appeal to the intellectual and moral faculties of their congregations in common language, they would attract hearers from all classes and exercise an extensive beneficial influence.

I am ambitious to see asylum superintendents exercising their great and legitimate influence in their respective districts by showing how insanity has

its origin in causes which we may readily trace, and which are in a great measure under our control.

UNIVERSITIES AND TEACHING HOSPITALS

St. Mary's Hospital, London

Dr. Robin Priest has been appointed to the Chair of Psychiatry at St. Mary's Hospital Medical School, and will take up his appointment in August 1973.

Dr. Priest, who is at present Senior Lecturer at St. George's Hospital Medical School, qualified in 1956 at University College Hospital and has worked at the Universities of Edinburgh and Chicago. His varied research interests have included the use of psychodynamic, epidemiological and neurophysiological approaches to a wide range of problems.

A new psychiatric unit, comprising 58 beds, 80 day places, an out-patient clinic and professorial unit laboratories, is being built at St. Mary's Hospital, Harrow Road, and is expected to be opened in the Autumn of 1973. This unit will take district responsibility for a defined catchment area.
