This inaugural volume in the Central Asia Book Series is a travel memoir by the distinguished Swedish scholar and diplomat, Ambassador Gunnar Jarring. His account of two extended visits to Sinkiang (Eastern Turkistan) separated by a half-century interval gives this work an extraordinary perspective. Particularly informative and interesting are Dr. Jarring's unique observations and insights, based on his extensive knowledge of the area and the Central Asian Uighurs and their language.

Gunnar Jarring served his native Sweden as a diplomat—several times at the ambassadorial level—in posts in India, Sri Lanka, Iran, Iraq, Pakistan, the United States, the United Nations, and the Soviet Union.
