Membership in the association is open to persons who are professionally interested in the modern languages and literatures. The dues for a joint membership are \$40 above the dues that would be paid by the higher-income member alone. Foreign members pay the same as regular members (use the American-dollar equivalent to ascertain the dues category). Membership applications are available on request and at the MLA Web site (www.mla.org).

For libraries and other institutions, a subscription in 2011 to the electronic format of *PMLA* alone is \$180 and to the print and electronic formats is \$200 (domestic and Canadian) or \$225 (foreign). Subscriptions include the annual volume of *Profession*, the MLA's journal of opinion about the modern language profession, in the same medium or media as *PMLA*. They also include online access to the 2002–10 volumes of both journals. For an additional \$170, institutional subscribers receive a clothbound edition of the 2011 volume of *PMLA*. Agents deduct four percent as their fee. Claims for undelivered issues will be honored if they are received within six months of the publication date; thereafter the single-issue price will be charged.
