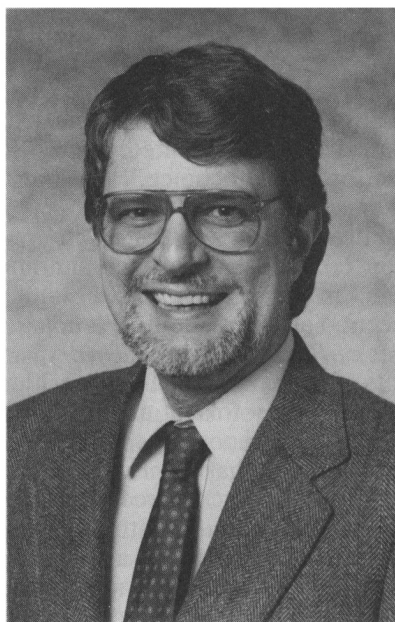
Catherine E. Rudder, Executive Director, American Political Science Association, has been named to the Board of the Carter Center.

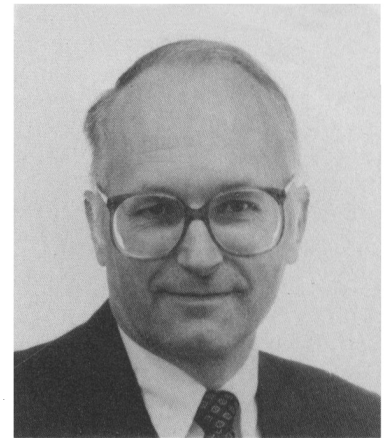

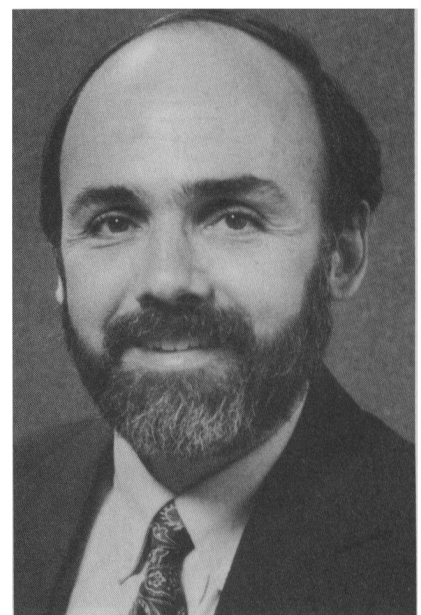
