CENSUS OF MANUSCRIPTS

The *Supplement to the Census of Medieval and Renaissance Manuscripts* in the United States and Canada (cf. RN I, 72) is making progress, and all pertinent material should reach the editor, C. V. KREISLER COLLECTION

Fritz Kreisler's collection of early books and manuscripts was auctioned at the Parke Bernet Galleries, New York, N. Y., and described in the New York newspapers on January 23, 1949. Among the many XVth century items was the *Schatzbahelter*, Nuremberg, 1491, with ninety-six full-page woodcuts by Wolgemut.

SHORT TITLE CATALOGUE

H. Adelbert White (University of Nebraska) is continuing his efforts to make a subject-index of the works noted in the *Short Title Catalogue*, taking into account also the *Check-List of American Copies*, revised edition by William W. Bishop (cf. RN I, 26). Mr. White has recently compiled a three-page mimeographed report to supplement the earlier statements of February, 1943, and December, 1944. Individual cards include

the number of the book in the *STC*, the name of the author, the short title as found in the *STC* (with now and then slight revision for clarity or fuller information), and several of the main locations in Great Britain and the United States.
