SUBJECT AREA	Changes in the international system that result in significant shifts in the locus of political authority and political allegiance away from the territorial state. At present, emphasis is being given to the following areas: <ol style="list-style-type: none">1) transnational relations,2) elite networks,3) impact studies.
RESEARCH DESIGN	Projects that, in terms of research objectives, design, and measurement strategies, promise to add qualitatively new dimensions to the field. Special emphasis on comparative research.
ACADEMIC STATUS	Designed to encourage pre- or post-doctoral scholars affiliated with US or Canadian institutions.
NATURE OF ASSISTANCE	Supplemental, primarily travel and maintenance of the recipient. Assistance will not cover tuition fees at academic institutions, family allowances, or salary, except under exceptional circumstances. Awards are made for no longer than one year, and in the past have rarely exceeded \$5,000. If a proposal is a two-year project, it will be necessary to refile an application for the following year. Budget should be prepared based on economy air fare plus the per diem rate for the country visited as indicated in the US State Department's Standard Per Diem Regulations.
