The only foreigner to take part in the Long March, Otto Braun was a Comintern agent of German birth who spent the years 1932-1939 as a military advisor to the Chinese Communist Party. His memoirs are an invaluable historical source and his book is one of the half-dozen that must be regarded as basic to a study of the Chinese Revolution. In addition to a wealth of factual information, Braun's observations offer important new insights on such key political and military issues as Mao's policies toward the Fukien Rebellion and the Sian Incident, the break in radio communications with Moscow during 1934-1936, the strategy of the Long March, and the Tsunyi Conference of 1935, at which Mao became the party's undisputed leader. 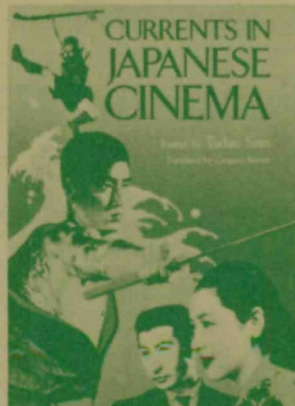

The Taiping movement of 1850–1864, whether seen as "rebellion" or "revolution," has long been recognized as one of the seminal events in modern Chinese history. One problem facing all serious students of the Taiping is the paucity of the primary sources available. Though several collections of the Chinese documents of the Rebellion translated into English have now been published, this collection for the first time reflects the state of knowledge about the Rebellion among the Westerners in China at the time.

Western Reports on the Taiping is a detailed series of reports written by Western journalists, missionaries, scholars, and government officials arranged chronologically. By collecting and commenting on these documents, the editors have created a volume of great value to readers interested in 19th century Chinese history, Chinese revolutionary history, and the Western impact in China.
