Special Meetings on Latin America

SSRC-ACLS Conference on Problems of Field Research in Latin America
Puerto Rico, October 21–23, 1966

The Joint Committee on Latin American Studies of the Social Science Research Council (SSRC) and the American Council on

Learned Societies (ACLS) convened the conference to improve communication among younger scholars who have recently conducted field research in Latin America, and to learn more about the problems and opportunities posed by this research. Most of the participants were current or former recipients of fellowships under the Foreign Area Fellowship Program. They prepared brief, informal papers about their field research and ways of meeting difficulties they had encountered. The topics discussed included access to libraries and archives, feasibility of survey research and other methods of collecting new data, cultural aspects of research, guidelines for substantive research in various disciplines, collaboration in research by Latin and North American scholars and prospects for the future. 1st Meeting of Latin-American Linguistics and Dialectology Section—Madrid,
October 24–29, 1966

The Latin-American Linguistics and Dialectology Section of the Inter-American Program of Linguistics and Language Teaching

and OFINES (Oficina Internacional de Observación e Información del Español) met to formulate the fundamental aspects of a project to study the cultured linguistic norm in the principal cities of Latin America and Spain. The executive committee agreed upon the following points: 1) the geographic range of the project—responsibility for execution of the work will be given to representatives of the following cities and institutions: Barcelona (Antonio Badía, Universidad de Barcelona), Bogotá (Luis Flórez, Instituto Caro y Cuervo), Buenos Aires (Ana María Barrenechea), La Habana (H. López Morales,

Joseph Matluck, University of Texas), Lima (Depto. de Lingüísticas de la Universidad de San Marcos), Madrid (Manuel Criado, Oficina Internacional del Español), Mexico City (Juan M. Lope Blanch, Universidad Nacional Autónoma de México and El Colegio de México), Montevideo (José P. Rona, Universidad Mayor de la República), and Santiago de Chile (Ambrosio Rabanales, Instituto de Filología de la Universidad de Chile, and Lidia Contreras, Asociación Chilena de Profesores e Investigadores de Lingüística y Literatura); 2) socio-cultural limits of the investigation; 3) linguistic aspects; and 4) methodology of the study. It is anticipated that the project will be completed by 1975 with the intervening nine years devoted to one year of preparation of the guide-questionnaire (1967); five years for recording, transcription, analysis, and classification of the material; three years for the final coordination of the results obtained in each city and for the composition of the final reports.

Mesa Redonda de Historia Económica Contemporánea—Santiago, Chile, November 7–15, 1966

Posibilidades de la Investigación de Historia Económica en Hispanoamérica Contemporánea was the theme of this meeting sponsored

by the Centro de Investigaciones de Historia Americana of the Universidad de Chile. Papers on the agenda included Proyecto de estudio sobre la Renta Nacional de la República Argentina entre 1870 y 1935 by Tulio Halperín Donghi, Roberto Cortés Conde, and Haydée Gorostegui de Torres, all of Argentina; and Población y despoblación rural de la provincia de Buenos Aires, 1869–1960 by Nicolás Sánchez Albornóz of Argentina. Other key participants were Luis González González, El Colegio de México; Juan Antonio Oddone, Universidad de la República del Uruguay; and Alvaro Jara and Rolando Mellafe of the Centro de Investigaciones de Historia Americana, who were also responsible for organizing the sessions.

Foreign Area Fellowship Program Conference on Latin American Studies Mexico City, December 8–9, 1966

The United States-Latin American Faculty Interchange Program of the Foreign Area Fellowship Program, under the direction of

Schuyler C. Wallace, sponsored this meeting for the consideration of two problem areas: 1) the advisability of continuing coordination and exchange of information relevant to faculty interchanges upon termination of the United States-Latin American Faculty Interchange Program; and 2) difficulties attendant upon research in Latin America by United States scholars and possible ways of overcoming them. In the introductory remarks, Charles Wagley of Columbia University spoke on Latin American Scholars at United States Institutions; Kalman H. Silvert, Dartmouth College, on Research in Latin America by United States Scholars; John P. Harrison, University of Texas, on Research in

Latin America by U.S. Scholars; and Victor L. Urquidi, El Colegio de México, on Research in Mexico by United States Scholars. Forty-two scholars from universities and institutions in the U.S. and Mexico then deliberated on the problem areas. The major outgrowth of the conference was the formation of a steering committee to be named the Committee on Area Studies Centers of the Latin American Studies Association. A report on the conference is available in limited quantity from the Foreign Area Fellowship Program, 444 Madison Ave., New York, N.Y. 10022. This meeting represented the final session in a three-meeting series on Latin American Studies; the United States-Latin American Faculty Interchange Program has now terminated.

Workshop-Seminar on Latin American Peasant Movements—Ithaca, N.Y., December 8–10, 1966

Cornell University's New York State School of Industrial and Labor Relations and the Latin American Program sponsored this

first meeting of its kind on Latin American Peasant Movements. Henry A. Landsberger and James O. Morris organized the sessions. Papers presented included *The Peasant Movement of La Convención, Perú* by Wesley Craig, University of North Carolina, Raleigh; *Societal Opposition to Peasant Movements and Its Effects on Farm People in Latin America* by Ernest Feder, CIDA; *A View from the Grass-Roots: Peasant Syndicates among the Aymara of the Bolivian Yungas* by Dwight B. Heath, Brown University; *An Analysis of the Peasant Movement of Pernambuco, Brazil: 1961–1964* by Cynthia N. Hewett, Cornell University; *The English Peasant Uprising of 1381* by Betty H. Landsberger and Henry A. Landsberger, Cornell; *A Vineyard Worker's Strike: A Case Study of the Relationship Between Church, Intellectuals and Peasants in Chile* by Henry A. Landsberger; *The Peasant Union Movement in Guatemala* by Neale J. Pearson, Miami University; and *The Peasant Union Movement in Venezuela* by John D. Powell, University of Southern California. The possibility of holding a second meeting of this type in Chile is being explored with the ICIRA, Casilla 1949, Santiago.

Meeting of Joint Committee on Latin American Studies (SSRC-ACLS) Guanajuato, December 10, 1966

Conferences of Mutual Interest was the title of this session sponsored by the Joint Committee on Latin American Studies of the

**Conference on Social Change in
Latin America—Austin, Texas,
January 25–28, 1967**

Jointly sponsored by the University of Texas and the Southern Regional Education Board, the conference was designed for journal-

ists who report on events in Latin America. Principal presentations were The Significance of Social Change in Latin America as Seen by the Sociologist by Gino Germani, Harvard University; Key Economic Problems and Their Political Aspects by Gregory B. Wolfe, Office of Research and Analysis for American Republics, U.S. Department of State; Political Aspects of Social Change in Latin America by Kalman H. Silvert, Dartmouth College; Patterns of Foreign Relations in Latin America by Bryce Wood, Social Science Research Council; and The Role of the Press in Reporting on Social Change in Latin America by Tad Szulc, *New York Times*. Reed Sarratt of the Southern Regional Education Board (130 Sixth St., N.W., Atlanta, Ga. 30313) is in charge of plans to publish the conference proceedings.

**Ethnopharmacologic Search for
Psycho-Active Drugs—San Francisco,
January 28–30, 1967**

Representatives of the various disciplines usually involved in the discovery and development of therapeutic agents from natural

sources—anthropologists, ethnobotanists, medical and economic botanists, pharmacognosists and phytochemists, pharmacologists and clinicians—attended the conference. Among the presentations, several focused on the use and properties of ethnopharmacologic drugs in Latin America: Empiricism and Magic in Aztec Pharmacology by Efrén Carlos del Pozo, Universidad Nacional

Autónoma de México; Anthropological Survey of the Use of South American Snuffs by S. Henry Wassen, Ethnographical Museum, Gothenburg, Sweden; Botanical Origin of South American Snuffs by Richard E. Schultes, Botanical Museum, Harvard University; Vilca and Its Use by Siri Von Reis Altschul, Botanical Museum of Harvard University; Experience in the Use of Epena among Indians of the Waika Tribes by Georg J. Seitz, Rio de Janeiro; Chemical Constituents and Pharmacology of South American Snuffs by Bo Holmstedt, Karolinska Institute, Stockholm; Psychotropic Properties of the Harmala Alkaloids by Claudio Naranjo, Universidad de Chile; Chemical Compounds Isolated from Banisteriopsis and Related Species by Venancio Delofeu, Universidad de Buenos Aires; and a film on The Making of the Hallucinogenic Drink from Banisteriopsis Cuapi in Northern Peru presented by Dermot Taylor, The Center for the Health Sciences, University of California, Los Angeles. Proceedings were to be published by the Government Printing Office in the spring of 1967.

Round Table on Latin American Integration and the Question of Constitutionality—Bogotá, February 6–8, 1967

Jointly sponsored by the Inter-American Institute of International Legal Studies and the National University of Colombia, the meeting involved 23 experts in

constitutional or international law representing Argentina, Bolivia, Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Costa Rica, Ecuador, Guatemala, Panamá, Perú, the United States, Uruguay, and Venezuela, as well as international organizations, the OAS Inter-American Development Bank, and the European Communities.

A Memorandum submitted by the Department of Legal Affairs of the PAU on The Integration of Latin America and the Question of Constitutionality served as a central working paper for the round table. The general conclusion of the meeting was that no incompatibility exists between the Latin American constitutions now in force and an economic integration treaty that would confer supranational powers upon a central authority. Conclusions of the round table are embodied in OAS Doc. 32 (OEA/Ser.F/11.1—English), February 25, 1967.

Cornell University Church-University Consultation on International Education and Development—Ithaca, February 7–9, 1967

Participants in this Consultation organized by the Cornell United Religious Works were Cornell campus ministry personnel, Brazilian and American university

students, faculty members from the Cornell Latin American Program, and foundation directors and executives of several regional and national church boards and commissions of higher education. on Latin American Studies
Tuscaloosa, March 1–3, 1967**

Siana State University; Sturgis E. Leavitt, founder and director of the Institute of Latin American Studies (1941–1958), University of North Carolina; and Alfred B. Thomas, professor emeritus of Latin American history, University of Alabama. Two round tables comprising the program dealt with Latin American Studies in the United States: Background, Progress, and Present Status, and The Role of Latin American Universities in Latin American Society. Edward Terry, who organized the program, is director of the recently expanded Latin American Area Program at the University of Alabama (see p. 190 in Institutional News).

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1st Meeting of Wisconsin Council of Latin Americanists—Platteville, March 31, 1967

1st Meeting of Chancellors of Universities of West Indies—Tobago, April 27–30, 1967

University Cooperation in the Caribbean was the theme of the session, which was organized by Sir Philip Sherlock, University of

the West Indies, with Ford Foundation financial support. The tentative agenda included the following subjects for consideration as possible areas of cooperative effort among the universities: 1) a program of visiting university teachers and/or research workers; 2) collaboration in areas of research such as language studies, language teaching, industry and science in the Caribbean, problems of health and diseases of the Caribbean, food-crops and animal production in the Caribbean, and aspects of marine service in the Caribbean. Don Jaime Benitez, chancellor of the University of Puerto Rico, was scheduled to address the opening session on the Role of a University in Caribbean Development. Invited participants were chancellors and presidents of the University of Puerto Rico, Institute of Caribbean Studies at the University of Puerto Rico, Inter American University of Puerto Rico, Catholic University of Puerto Rico, College of the Virgin Islands, University of Oriente, Venezuela, Universidad del Valle, Colombia, University of Santo Domingo, University of Santiago, Dominican Republic, University of Haiti, University of Miami, University of Florida, University of the West Indies at Mona, Barbados, and St. Augustine, Trinidad.

University of Notre Dame Conference Toward an Inter-American System of Educational Technologies Notre Dame, May 26–27, 1967

Approximately 50 participants from inter-American organizations, universities, foundations, industry, broadcasting and films, and the government attended the

**2nd Meeting of Inter-American

Washington, D.C.,
October 25–November 1, 1966

Some 40 participants representing 15 Latin American countries and the United States participated in the meeting. Recommendations with relevance for the research

community were those pertaining to educational television; the expansion of teaching in the field of telecommunications in Brazil; the establishment in Argentina of a center for training and research in space communications; telecommunications as a factor in integration; and coordination of studies to complete preparation of the project for the Inter-American Telecommunications Network. **11th Meeting of Inter-American
Congress of Municipalities**
Caracas, November 13–16, 1966

The Municipality and the Basic Public Services for Development was the theme considered by 317 delegates and observers from all

Latin American countries, France, Spain, the United States, and international organizations. All documents related to aspects of the theme in Latin America. A complete body of documents was submitted to and published by the Organizing Commission of the Congress. Buenos Aires, November 14–21, 1966

INSTITUTIONAL NEWS

Académie du Monde Latine Founded in Paris

Members of the Institut de France and several ambassadors of interested countries gathered in Paris to constitute a pacific alliance of culture in the form of the Académie du Monde Latine. Jaime Torres-Bodet, former director-general of UNESCO, is president of the Académie for 1966–67. A Council, the governing body of the Académie, consists of a president and five vice-presidents representing nations whose languages are French, Italian, Portuguese, Romanian, and Spanish. The Académie is to have a membership of 100, appointed at first and elected later. The 100 members will be grouped into five sections—letters, exact sciences, human sciences, arts, and general—and the five languages will be represented in each group. Founders of the Académie were committed to the “development of spiritual currents among nations that originated from Rome,” because they have “in common a certain conception of the universal ideal.” The Académie is located at 217, Boulevard Saint-Germain, Paris 7e, France.
