

Grain Mills and Flour in Classical Antiquity

L. A. MORITZ

The author, reviewing the milling implements of Greece and Rome, argues that one of the fundamental changes in the grain-mill—the invention of the rotary mill—took place in classical antiquity, at a time much later than is commonly believed. In dealing with the meal and flour used for bread, he includes a detailed analysis of the relevant evidence in the eighteenth book of Pliny's *Natural History*.
