MESSAGE TO READERS

An appeal for new members, through the good offices of *The Times* and other journals, was launched on April 6, the 21st anniversary of the birthday of the Institute. Readers of the Journal will be interested to know that this appeal has brought in, to date, about 550 new members of the Institute.

The Institute has no endowments, and its work cannot be carried on from revenue derived solely from subscriptions of £1 is. per annum. The war has not only reduced the income of the Institute, but increased the cost of its work. For example, in regard to the production of the Journal alone, printing costs have increased by 66½ per cent, and the cost of paper by 110 per cent, since 1939. In order that the generous services provided by the Institute may be carried on, and especially that the Journal may be restored to its original format and number of issues as soon as possible, the Council looks forward to a steady increase in the number of subscribers. It also calls the attention of readers to the need of donations, small and large, and to the great benefit which the Institute would derive in the future from bequests.
