

Method used.	Percentage of married couples. ⁽ⁱⁱ⁾
The sheath (protective).....	42
The pill.....	17
All other contraceptives.....	16
Safe period.....	11
Withdrawal, etc.....	34

It's that last figure which worries us. Not just because we make the most widely used contraceptives. But because withdrawal is acknowledged as a hazardous method. And we'd like to see every child a wanted child.

That's far from what we have today. One leading authority, Mr. Caspar Brook, Director of the Family Planning Association, has estimated that half the babies born here every year aren't planned.⁽ⁱⁱⁱ⁾

ISSUES appear every 2 months, the first having appeared in July 1972. Each has 70-100 pages, 700-1000 references, an author index, and a geographical index. And if you send the special prepaid coupons by airmail most copies should be on your desk within 16 days, or faster if you live in Europe. (The cost is less for Europe, also.)

THE annual subscription to the *Bibliography of Family Planning & Population*, which includes airmail postage outside the UK, is £6, \$18 or Rs 125.
