THE EDITOR'S CORNER

By vote of the editorial staff and advisory board of the Business History Review, first prize in the Newcomen Awards in Business History, given annually by the Newcomen Society in North America for the best article published in the Review during the preceding year, has been awarded to Professor David S. Landes, Harvard University, for "Watchmaking: A Case Study in Enterprise and Change," which appeared in the Spring 1979 issue. The award consists of \$300 and a scroll. The Special Award of \$150 and a scroll, for the best article published in the Review during the preceding year by a recent Ph.D. who has not published in book form, has gone to Elaine Glovka Spencer, Assistant Professor of History, Northern Illinois University, DeKalb, Illinois, for "Rulers of the Ruhr: Leadership and Authority in German Big Business before 1914," which also appeared in the Spring 1979 issue.

Donald L. Kemmerer, President of the Lincoln Educational Foundation, announced at the recent annual meeting of the Business History Conference the award of three predoctoral Rovensky fellowships, each in the amount of \$3000, to the following persons: Peter Coclanis, Columbia University, a student of Stuart W. Bruchey, for a dissertation on "Economy and Society in Early Charleston"; Steven Lubar, University of Chicago, a student of Donald N.McCloskey, for a dissertation on "The Management of Technology in the Textile Mills of Lowell, Massachusetts"; and Paul A. Tiffany, University of California at Berkeley, a student of Joe Pratt, Edwin M. Epstein, and Richard M. Abrams, for a dissertation on "The Strategy and Structure of Modern Business-Government Interaction: Bethlehem Steel."

Students of American history who are interested in writing a dissertation in the fields of economic and business history, broadly defined, are urged to investigate these fellowships, which are awarded annually in memory of the late John E. Rovensky, American banker and businessman who died in 1970. Information and application blanks may be secured from Professor C. The Rovensky Fellowships were established for the purpose of "encouraging researchers and teachers to re-evaluate the role of this nation's business men in developing the existing economic system." The next deadline for applications is February 1, 1981.

The University of Pennsylvania Press has announced the establishment of two John L. Haney Prizes, each in the amount of \$5000, to be offered

every two years, one in humanistic and one in social scientific studies. The first two prizes will be awarded for books published or accepted for publication by the Press in 1980 and 1981. The Pennsylvania Historical and Museum Commission announces the publication of a guide to the public records in the custody of its Division of Archives and Manuscripts, *The Guide to the Record Groups in the Pennsylvania State Archives*. This volume lists records of the executive, legislative, and judicial branches of State government, as well as the archives of the Provincial and Revolutionary governments. The records

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are listed by series under the agency of origin or under a governmental unit which may have inherited the records and functions of a predecessor agency.
