



In order to ensure that technical regulations and product standards which vary from country to country do not create unnecessary obstacles to trade the Agreement on Technical Barriers to Trade was adopted. 



The Special Court for Sierra Leone was created in 2002 to prosecute "persons who bear the greatest responsibility" for serious violations of international humanitarian law and Sierra Leonean law in Sierra Leone since 30 November 1996. It started delivering decisions in March 2003 and should complete its work by the end of 2007. The present Digest is a collection of the most relevant abstracts of decisions and orders rendered by Chambers – Trial Chambers, Appeals Chamber, President – between March 2003 and 31 December 2005. 548 public decisions have been reviewed for its preparation. The abstracts have been selected on the basis of their relevance to the interpretation and application of the Statute and Rules of Procedure and Evidence or of their importance in the development of international criminal law. ### Note from the Managing Editor

This volume of International Legal Materials includes a wide array of critical international law developments in the fields of humanitarian law, human rights, criminal law, aviation, and investment arbitration. It includes a letter from John Bellinger III, Legal Adviser, U.S. Department of State, and William J. Haynes, General Counsel, U.S. Department of Defense, to Dr. Jakob Kellenberger, President of the International Committee of the Red Cross, questioning the methodology and reliance upon written materials rather than actual state practice for a number of rules identified as constituting "customary international law" in the Customary International Humanitarian Law study published in 2005 (Cambridge). Security Council Resolution 1747 is another attempt by the United Nations to exercise its Chapter VII sanctions authority over Iran to obtain compliance with regards to its nuclear program. The United Nations Convention and Optional Protocol on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities sets forth human rights standards on the international level that are already codified—to varying degrees—in the domestic legislation of many nations. The International Criminal Court Pre-Trial Chamber I decision provides a helpful analysis of the temporal and subject matter jurisdiction of the court in the context of the ongoing conflict in Darfur, Sudan and represents an important jurisprudential development of the court. The "Open Skies" agreement between the United States and the European Union is anticipated to provide important economic benefits to the United States and the European Union and will eliminate World War II era barriers on travel. The ICSID Biwater Gauff Procedural order explores the participation of amicus curiae in arbitral proceedings, on an ad hoc, limited basis. The Fourth Circuit's decision in the El Masri case provides the latest wrinkle in well-publicized case involving the state secrets doctrine; and the Ninth Circuit's decision in Sarei v. Rio Tinto illustrates the continuing effort of litigants to avail themselves of the Alien Torts Statute in suits against multinational corporations. While in the United States, a debate is ongoing about the reliance upon the jurisprudence of other nations and according such jurisprudence precedental value, the High Court of Malawi does just that in Kafantayeni v. Attorney General. Readers will also note that we have changed the title of "other documents received" to "other documents considered" to reflect the substantial effort invested in seeking out and considering documents for publication in International Legal Materials. To provide readers with a better sense of the content of the documents that we have decided not to publish, we have also included a brief synopsis of each one.

#### **Guidelines for Submission of Documents**

The ILM Office welcomes any effort to bring suitable documents to the Office's attention. Electronic files or web links are required for publication, although printed texts can be used for initial deliberations regarding republication.
