## **The Taiping Revolutionary Movement**

by Jen Yu-wen

The Taiping Revolutionary Movement, spanning the period 1851 to 1866, was one of the cataclysmic events of history. The stakes were immense: control of China and the transformation of Chinese society. The Taipings were true revolutionaries, in Mr. Jen's view, for they attacked not only the ruling dynasty but the prevailing order and social structure that supported it. However, because they lost, the movement has been known almost entirely from the official government side. In this volume, we see the story for the first time from the point of view of the revolutionaries. ## **Frontier Defense and the Open Door**

In the wake of the Sino-Japanese War, Americans and Chinese discovered Manchuria's strategic and economic importance. Although each approached the region with a different end in mind—frontier defense for the Chinese and the open door for the Americans—common enemies and complementary goals made cooperation a distinct and attractive possibility. However, when in 1909 the stage at last seemed set for a joint effort, hesitations in Peking and flaws in planning and executing policy in Washington forfeited this opportunity. This timely study, based on Chinese and American archives, sheds important new light on the interaction of late Ch'ing foreign policy and American expansionism under the Roosevelt and Taft administrations. \$12.50

## **Hsi-liang and the Chinese National Revolution**

by Roger V. Des Forges

Hsi-liang served China as a public official during the last three reigns of the Ch'ing dynasty. His career provides a focal point for this reexamination of the nature and origins of Chinese nationalism. In studying the late Ch'ing political theory, Professor Des Forges emphasizes such crucial issues as the role of tradition, the strong current of anti-imperialism, the development of new state policies, and the relation of all these to the collapse in 1911. Recent historians of twentieth-century China have demonstrated that the revolution did not result solely from the action of external forces upon a stagnating regime, but that forces of change were at work within that regime well before the turn of the century. Professor Des Forges extends this view by tracing the trends toward radical change that were implicit in the work of such elite leaders as Hsi-liang and that found their roots in past centuries of Chinese history. \$12.50

## **Szechwan and the Chinese Republic**

**Provincial Militarism and Central Power, 1911-1938**

by Robert A. Kapp

The province of Szechwan on the upper Yangtze, with fifty million inhabitants and enormous natural wealth, drifted beyond the grasp of external authorities in the wake of the 1911 Revolution. Even after the founding of Chiang Kai-shek's Nanking government in 1927, Szechwan remained dominated by a small clique of native-born generals and their armies. Mr. Kapp explores the growth and the functioning of provincial militarism in Szechwan and examines the provincial leaders' determined isolation from outside interference in the late 1920s and early 1930s. By focusing on a region and a period that have received little attention, Mr. Kapp confronts the broad questions of national integration and distribution of political power in modern China. \$10.00

Thick and Heavy Spade Coins (Historical Facts, Alphabetical Listings of Types, and Legends on the Thick and Heavy Spade Coins).

Extensive, time-consuming research was expended in analyzing the previous decipherments of the ancient seal-script legends found on these coins, since there was a great divergence of opinion by previous Chinese authors on this matter as evidenced by as many as 56 different decipherments found by the author on 17 types of Ch'i sword coins.

The cover picture on this volume depicts the cobblestone steps and rock trail, used for many centuries, that pilgrims still climb today to reach the top of Mt. T'ai, one of China's sacred mountains.

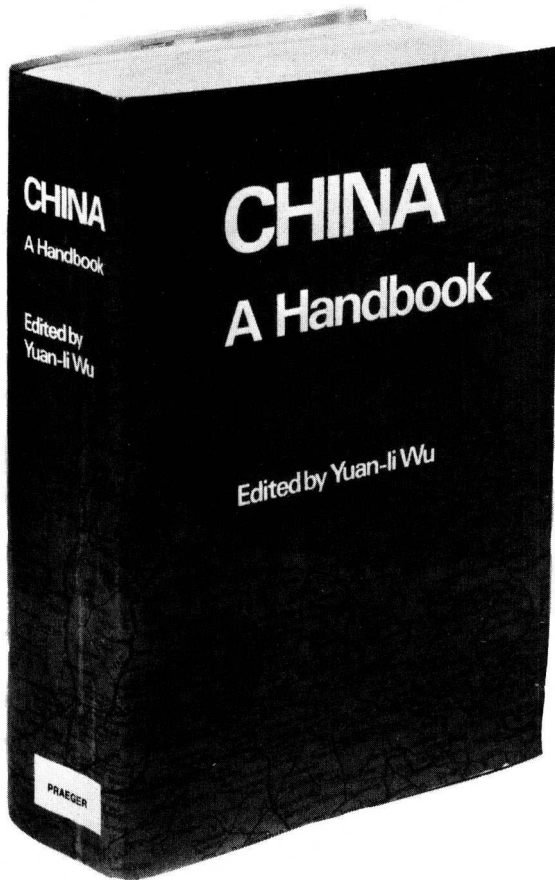
