January 24-31, 1987

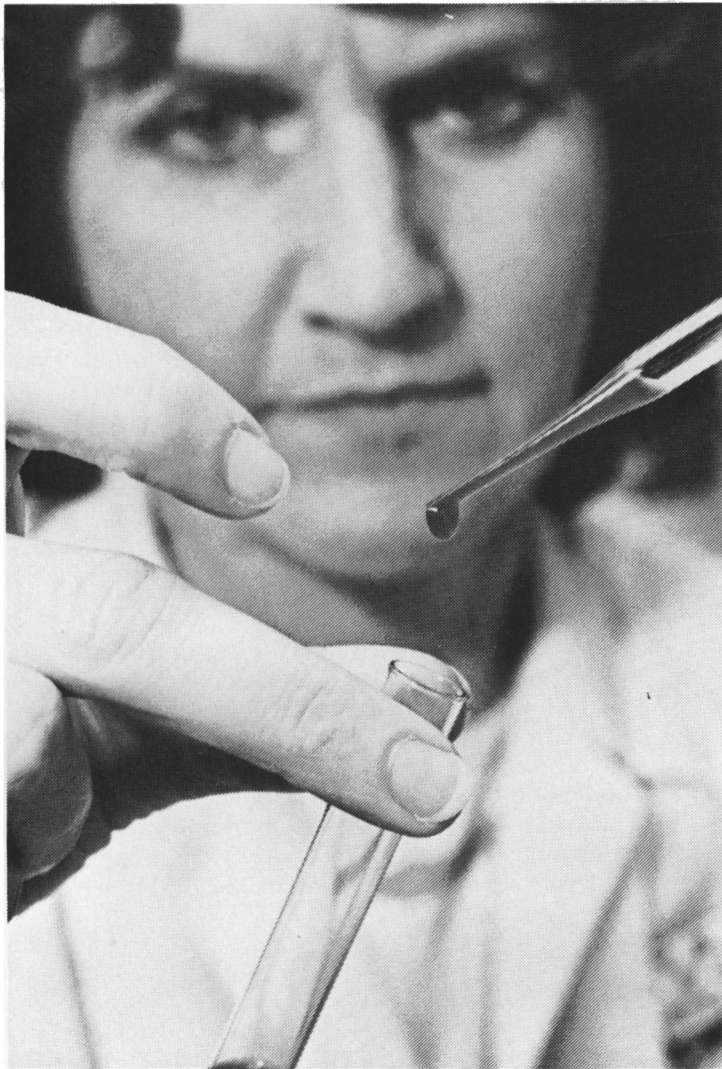
