

It aims to publish open access, high-quality, scholarly, engaging collections of history of science papers, which address provocative themes, and which will be free for readers and offer no financial barrier to publication for authors. Like its sister publication, *British Journal for the History of Science*, *BJHS Themes* is a journal of the British Society for the History of Science, a major learned society for its subject.

The 1st volume will be '*Intersections: Science and Technology in Twentieth Century China and India*', a focus on a history of science and technology in China and India, which will be convened by historians Jahnnavi Phalkey and Tong Lam. It will be published in early 2016.



INSTRUCTIONS FOR AUTHORS

Contributions of about 10,000 words should be submitted by email to the editorial office with a message that includes your name, telephone number, and email address. Submissions should be sent as an attachment in the format .doc or .docx to <sic@post.tau.ac.il>. The editors require that the article be introduced by a paragraph of about 150 words that presents its argument.

The journal follows the author-date reference system that is generally used in the social and natural sciences. ‘Documentation 2 Author-Date Citations and Reference Lists’ of the *Chicago Manual of Style* and a back issue of the journal should be used as guides. More detailed instructions for contributors and specific guidelines (e. g. for transliteration from Russian or Hebrew) are available from <http://journals.cambridge.org/action/displayJournal?jid=SIC>. Unusual alphabets, special characters, mathematical and chemical formulas, and all diacritical marks should be clearly indicated. Articles may be illustrated by a small number of figures in black and white, formatted in TIFF, with a minimum resolution of 300 dpi for halftones and 600 dpi for line drawings.
