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
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
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Call for Papers

Environmental Conservation Themed Issue on *Biodiversity Governance in Central and Eastern Europe*

The transition to a market economy, democratisation and accession to the European Union have challenged countries of Central and Eastern Europe (CEE) to undertake significant political and policy reforms, including in the governance of biodiversity. As many of these countries are substantially biodiverse, it is of wide interest to assess their success in establishing governance regimes that can protect biodiversity effectively and legitimately.

This thematic issue will explore the harmonisation of national legislation in the new member states with European Union policies and directives, considering also how European policies are influencing biodiversity governance in neighbouring CEE countries. It will aim to shed light on how the Europeanisation of environmental governance and emergence of multi-level governance structures has transformed environmental politics, conservation and environmental conflicts. In doing this, the thematic issue will strengthen the evidence-base on the functioning and performance of biodiversity governance in new EU member states and neighbouring countries.

The purpose of this thematic issue is to generate one of the first collections of articles on Central and Eastern European biodiversity governance. Papers can take the form of case studies, comparative studies, or thematic / geographical reviews but the editors will prioritize strong empirical contributions. Submitted papers must focus on Central and Eastern Europe. They may target, but are not limited to:

- The emergence of multi-level biodiversity governance frameworks and the implications for environmental politics in the region;
- Forms of and experiences with public participation in biodiversity and environmental governance;
- Implementation and effectiveness of biodiversity governance, including protected area designation and the implementation of management strategies or plans therein.

Submission Guidelines

Only original and unpublished high-quality research papers are considered and manuscripts must be in English. Manuscripts must be submitted to the journal at <http://mc.manuscriptcentral.com/envcon> in accordance with our Instructions for Authors, which are available at <http://tiny.cc/iv6kg>. **You must provide a cover letter indicating that the submission is for the issue on “Biodiversity Governance in Central and Eastern Europe”.** If this is not supplied, or if too many/insufficient papers are accepted for a particular theme, they will be published as regular submissions in the journal. All papers will undergo a rigorous peer-review process - that they are part of a themed issue (solicited or not) does not guarantee acceptance.

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Manuscript submission

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- Research Papers (<8000 words including legends and references)
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Articles received by the Journal will undergo a pre-screening process to increase the efficiency of the publication process. Papers that are considered to be of minor importance to the readership of the Journal are not reviewed and any papers with format problems are returned for revision. Papers selected for review are sent out to three referees, who agree to undertake the refereeing within a short period of time.

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The second page should contain a Summary followed by the main body of text. The Summary should be concise and informative, and complete in itself. It should succinctly express the context, purpose, methods, findings, approach and implications of the study. There should be no references or unexplained abbreviations. Avoid phrases such as 'are described', 'will be discussed', etc. Comments and Reports do not have a Summary, but please remember that all submissions require an additional Abstract at submission, which is used in the review process.
