In 2007 the International Association of Constitutional Law conducted a survey of the use of foreign precedents by Supreme and Constitutional Courts. Its purpose was to determine, through empirical research, to what extent foreign case law is cited. The results, published here for the first time, give us the best evidence yet of the existence and limits of a transnational constitutional communication between courts.
