#### *Special Meetings on Latin America*

**Oral History Meeting  
Austin, June 29–30, 1967**

A meeting to consider methodology and training in oral history was held at the University of Texas, guided by James Wilkie, director of the Oral History Center for Latin America, Ohio State University. The Conference on Latin American History (CLAH) sponsored the sessions. Purpose of oral history is to produce a reliable source of information concerning events and persons, through taped dialogues of extensive length with various political leaders. At present, many tapes have been catalogued which treat the Mexican Revolution of 1910 and the Bolivian Revolution of 1952. At the meeting, interest was expressed in recording oral history of the Guatemalan Revolution and the Jânio Quadros government of Brazil. **CIAP Subcommittee Country Review  
Meetings—Washington, D. C.**  
September 1967–February 1968

The fourth cycle of Country Review meetings was carried out by a subcommittee of the Inter-American Committee on the Alliance for Progress (CIAP) during the winter. The conclusions reached and suggestions for economic development by the subcommittee for each country reviewed are noted in issues of the *Alliance for Progress Weekly Newsletter*, published by the Alliance for Progress Information Team, Pan American Union, Washington, D. C. 20006. For each meeting, the success or failure of a single country to reach its Alliance goals of economic development for the last year were studied. Estimates were made of external financing which would be needed by that country for the next year. Economic policies and national planning programs were examined, with regard to their feasibility and realistic approach to development needs. Countries studied and the date of the *Newsletter* issue in which coverage of each country review appears follow: Paraguay, September 18, 1967; Trinidad and Tobago, September 25, 1967; Honduras, October 2, 1967; Bolivia, November 13, 1967; Costa Rica, November 13, 1967; Brazil, November 20, 1967; Venezuela, November 27, 1967; Chile, December 4, 1967; Panama, December 11, 1967; Mexico, January 1, 1968; Colombia, January 22, 1968; and El Salvador, January 22, 1968.

**International Conference of Association for  
Comparative Economics—Bellagio, Italy**  
September 3–9, 1967

Participants from 12 countries, including Ivan Lansberg-Henríquez, president, Dividendo Voluntario para la Comunidad,

Caracas, and Felipe Pazos, Inter-American Development Bank, attended the conference, which had as its theme *Convergence and Divergence of Economic Systems in the Process of Socioeconomic Development*. **Seminar on Political Science and the University—Buenos Aires**

**1st University of Florida Conference on Human Mobility in Latin America and Africa**  
Gainesville, November 29–December 3, 1967

Replacing the discontinued Caribbean Conference, the Conference on Human Mobility and Social Change in Two Continents

was sponsored by the Center for Latin American Studies, the African Studies Program, and the Center for Tropical Agriculture at the University of Florida. D. L. Niddrie was in charge of organizing the sessions. The consequences of human mobility were studied through views of migration, increasing urbanization, and industrialization on the one hand, and food production, population pressures, and cultural changes on the other. Six sessions considered the various topics: 1) Time, Space and Human Mobility, with papers on Latin America by Sugiyama Iutaka, University of Florida, and Harley Browning, Population Research Center, University of Texas; 2) Society, Economics and Population Change, featuring papers by Jorge Balán, Population Research Center, University of Texas, and Francine Rabinovitz, University of Florida; 3) Food Production, Human Mobility and Disease, with talks by J. Clyde Swartzwelder, Louisiana State University, department of tropical medicine and medical parasitology, and Antonio Peña Chavarria, LSU-ICMRT in San José, Costa Rica; 4) Education, Training Processes and Human Mobility, addressed by Fernando Cámara Barbachano, Museo Nacional de Antropología, Mexico City, and Solon T. Kimball, University of Florida; 5) Detribalization, Community Development and Human Mobility, with papers by Carlos de Medina, Centro Latino-Americano de Pesquisas em Ciências Sociais, Rio de Janeiro, and Dwight B. Heath, Brown University; and 6) Leadership, Government and Human Mobility, featuring talks by Paul Lewis, Tulane University, and Arpad von Lazar, Fletcher School of Law and Diplomacy, Tufts University. **1st International Symposium on  
Industrial Development**  
Athens, November 29–December 19, 1967

Among the regional symposia which prepared the groundwork for the worldwide gathering in Athens, Greece, the Latin American

Symposium on Industrial Development was conducted in Santiago, Chile March 14–25, 1966 (see LARR I:3, p. 145). Informal consultations were held by the Economic Commission for Latin America and member governments on the formulation of a common Latin American position at the International Symposium. Delegations from 131 governments and representatives of the private sector in some countries attended the Athens meeting. Considerations included: 1) a general survey of world industry with special reference to developing countries; 2) situation, problems and prospects of main industrial sectors; 3) policies and measures in developing countries; and 4) international aspects of industrial development. Comprehensive papers were prepared and distributed in advance by the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), to provide a basis for discussion. Information is available

Caracas, October 9–20, 1967

Postponed from the original August dates because of the earthquake in Caracas, the 5th Inter-American Statistical Conference

was conducted according to original plan, along with the 9th Session of the Committee on Improvement of National Statistics (COINS), and the 28th Session of the Executive Committee of the Inter-American Statistical Institute, sponsoring institution. The participants conducted a review of statistical activities carried out during the period 1962–1967, since the 4th Inter-American Statistical Conference, and established orientations for related activities to be developed in the immediate future, before the 6th Conference, in particular the housing, agriculture, and population censuses to be undertaken under the Program for the 1970 Census of America. Working documents for the sessions were: *Statistical Activities in the American Region since the Fourth Inter-American Statistical Conference and Programming Statistical Activities for the American Region: Background and Bases*, as well as others related to particular topical sessions: *Estadísticas para la integración económica regional* by Menazei Schellenberg-Orloff; *Measurement of Economic and Social Development* by Emilio G. Barreto; *Electronic Computers in Data Processing* by Angus B. McMorrán; *Electronic Computer Management in the U.S. Bureau of the Census* by Robert F. Drury; *The Center for Computation of the General Bureau of Statistics and National Censuses of Venezuela* by Cristóbal Bonín; *The Utilization of Electronic Computers in the General Bureau of Statistics of Mexico* by Rubén Gleason Galicia and Javier Bonilla García; *Statistical Methods for the Estimation of Health Needs* by Hugo Behm Rosas and Adela Legarreta Peña; another of the same subject by F. Other items on the agenda included considerations of the situation of scientific communication in Latin America, progress of the various institutes since the first conference in Caracas (see LARR II:2, p. 172), participation of national centers in studies on integration, and strategy of social science research in Latin America. Seventy-three participants

were present at the meeting which was planned by the Centro de Estudios sobre Desarrollo Económico (CEDE), Universidad de los Andes, Bogotá, Colombia.

**4th Biennial Conference: Latin American Urgency: Development Immaculata, Pa., October 21, 1967**

The Department of History and Center for the Teaching of the Americas of Immaculata College, in cooperation with the American

Historical Association, sponsored this conference, the fourth in a series of sessions on Latin America. Addresses were delivered by Mario Rodríguez, George Washington University, on *The Historic Roots of Latin American Development*, and by Richard Richardson, associate coordinator of the Alliance for Progress, on *The New Demands for Development in Latin America*. Conference groups focused on Brazil, Peru, Bolivia, Chile, Central America, and Mexico, with expert consultants for each group. **11th Inter-American Congress of Psychology—Mexico City**  
December 17–22, 1967

The Contribution of Psychology and the Behavioral Sciences to Social Growth and Economic Development was the theme of the

congress, which was organized by Rogelio Díaz-Guerrero. Participants represented all fields of psychology and every Latin American country, as well as Canada. Twenty symposia considered such subjects as Estudio Ecológico del Desarrollo Humano en Areas Rurales de Latinoamérica, Dimensions in Cross-Cultural Research, Current Research in Teaching, Estudios Psicométricos de Confiabilidad: Batería de Pruebas en el Estudio de la Personalidad del Escolar Mexicano, Medida y Descripción de Cambios de Valores, and Cultural and

Economic Influences on Intellectual Development of Young Children, each symposium having four to six papers presented, in either Spanish or English. Thirty paper sessions consisted of treatises with unique contributions and others grouped under such headings as Cross Cultural Studies, Psicoterapia de Grupos, Problems in Psychophysiology, and Problems of Cultural Deprivation or Conflict of Culture in Children. Special sessions featured filmed dialogues with notable contributors to psychology, student round tables, and procedural considerations. **134th Annual Meeting of American Association for the Advancement of Science—New York City  
December 26–31, 1967**
