## Trade and Growth in the Philippines

### An Open Dual Economy

By GEORGE L. HICKS and GEOFFREY McNICOLL. Integrating formal economic theory with empirical case study, this book is primarily an exercise in applying aggregative analytical techniques to the postwar Philippine economy. The formal model of an open dual economy that the authors develop and apply explicitly recognizes a foreign exchange constraint on growth and thus emphasizes the role of the export sector in the development process. Using this analytical tool, they show that the Philippine economy is in a much less healthy state than many observers have believed.

# Americans and Chinese Communists, 1927-1945

## A Persuading Encounter

By KENNETH E. SHEWMAKER

Focusing of the writings and experiences of Americans who traveled in China from 1937 to 1945, this book describes and analyzes the almost unanimously favorable reactions of the first Americans to encounter Chinese Communists. After a background sketch of foreign reporting before 1937, Mr. Shewmaker explores the direct, personal reactions to the Communists of such people as Edgar and Helen Snow, Agnes Smedley, Evans F. Carlson, Anna Louise Strong, and Theodore H. White, and compares their impressions to reality.

Many of the individuals discussed later became targets of the "Communist conspiracy" charges during the 1950's, and a major aim of the book is to show that the conspiracy thesis is wholly inadequate to deal with the complexities of Sino-American contacts. On the other hand, the author criticizes as over-simple the image of the Communists as "agrarian reformers" that was prevalent among American observers during the 1930's and 1940's.

The book provides a balanced and orderly account of a controversial aspect of Sino-American history—a reasoned interpretation of why events occurred and why people behaved as they did. The narrative is enhanced by character sketches of such principal Chinese figures as Mao Tse-tung and Chiang Kai-shek.

Edited by RAVINDER KUMAR, *University of New South Wales*. The Rowlatt Act of 1919 was intended to control those political groups in India committed to the overthrow of the British Raj. The Act evoked widespread opposition, which Gandhi developed into a political campaign through the new technique of *satyagraha*, or soul-force and non-violence. The essays in this collection explore the climate and structure of politics in India in 1919. They focus in particular on the cities which responded enthusiastically to the Rowlatt Satyagraha, and thus illumine both the great political agitations launched by Gandhi and the nature of political society in India. By D. DEVAHUTI. Harsha-vardhana of Sthānviśvara and Kanauj is one of the most famous rulers of the ancient period. ### PHONETIC ANALYSIS

Compiled by R. L. TURNER and D. R. TURNER. Indo-Aryan is the term applied to that branch of the Indo-European languages which was brought into India by the Aryans and out of which have emerged the principal languages of Pakistan, India, Nepal, and Ceylon. By G. M. HENRY. In this book the author describes the four hundred species of birds which can be seen in Ceylon. The introduction provides hints on learning to recognize the different species, briefly discusses the topography, climate and vegetation of Ceylon, and gives a systematic index of the bird families described. There are pictures of 309 of the 403 forms covered, many in color. For this revised edition a number of illustrations have been added, with an appendix listing the names of bird families. By SUDHINDRANATH DATTA. While a disciple of the principal person associated with the revival of Bengali culture, Rabindranath Tagore, Datta was himself a leader in the revival of Bengali poetry. This book's title is that of Datta's autobiography, of which only the early chapters were ever written. Published here for the first time, it evokes the mode of life and the outlook of the educated and prosperous class of Bengalis at the beginning of the twentieth century. Also included are a number of essays that examine Bengali literature, language, and art. Finally, this edition presents translations of some of Datta's poems. \$6.00

AND THE PORTS ON THE NORTH AND EAST COASTS OF SUMATRA

By JOHN ANDERSON, with an introduction by A. J. S. REID, *Australian National University*. Between 1813 and 1830 Anderson served in Malaya as a member of the Civil Service of the East India Company. While there, he had written numerous accounts of his missions and of official dealings with the Malay states. *Acheen* included such selections from these papers as appeared relevant to the author's theme of resisting Dutch advances in Sumatra. The core of the book is an account of the important period of Atjehnese civil war, when Britain could have decided that state's destiny. 1 fold-out map, 14 tables. ## Mission to the East Coast of Sumatra in 1823

By JOHN ANDERSON, with an introduction by NICHOLAS TARLING, *University of Auckland*. In 1823 John Anderson went on a mission to promote trade among the merchants of Sumatra. Beside the commercial and political character of the mission, Anderson was instructed to collect "an authentic but not voluminous account of the state of each Country he may visit. . ." ## Sĕjarah Mĕlayu or Malay Annals

AN ANNOTATED TRANSLATION

Edited by C. C. BROWN, with a new introduction by R. ROOLVINK, *University of Malaya*. It is generally agreed that the *Sĕjarah Mĕlayu* is the finest of all Malay classics, and one of the most important historical works concerned with Malaysia. The Sultan of Malacca's command to the author was "to compose a book on the descent of the Malay Rajas and how they are related." This grew into a collection of stories about rulers and their courts, not only about Malay Rajas but also about rulers in South India, China, Indo-China, Siam, and Java. 2 maps. Volumes 1-4 Coming Summer 1971

This author catalogue gives systematic coverage to some 25 British libraries with sizeable Oriental collections and partial coverage to another 39 libraries. It includes works published in all languages in Asia outside the Soviet Union and those published in Arabic or the Ethiopic languages in North Africa. All subjects are covered except pure science and technology and the 58,000 different titles range from modern works to works of great rarity published three or four hundred years ago.

Apart from its day-to-day uses the catalogue will provide, by reason of the richness and scope of the collections which it records, an important new source of bibliographic reference for readers in all fields of Oriental studies. An unusually large number of cross-references have been inserted to reduce the complexities of a field in which it is notoriously difficult to establish uniformity. This contribution to the establishment of improved bibliographic control in a field of growing importance will be maintained and extended by the publication of annual supplements to the four primary volumes.

## **RICE ECONOMY: EMPLOYMENT AND INCOME IN MALAYSIA**

Although Malaysia has one of the highest per capita incomes in Southeast Asia, the rural sector of her economy is no better off than what is to be found elsewhere in the region, where rice is the most important crop and rice cultivation the predominant feature of the rural economy. With the recent phenomenal growth in double-cropping through the use of higher yielding varieties of rice, there has not been a corresponding improvement in the employment situation among rice farmers. Coming to the fore as perhaps the major problem facing development during the coming decades is that of underemployment. With the population explosion of the 1950's being transformed into the labor force explosion of the 1970's and 1980's, Professor Purcal's timely analysis of the Malaysian situation will prove of significant value in tracing the roots of Asian surplus labor in the future.
