Bawa Satinder Singh has brought the letters of Charles Stewart Hardinge, second Viscount of Lahore, together in an extensively annotated edition, providing an intimate and privileged look at a British official's life in India during the mid- to late 1840s. Chronicling such diverse subjects as the Sikh war, the Kashmir insurrection, and the opium trade, *My Indian Peregrinations* provides both immediacy and context to scholars of colonial India, imperial culture, and nineteenth-century Britain.

Bawa Satinder Singh is professor of history at Florida State University and has published articles on the political history of the Punjab and Kashmir. He is also the editor of *The Letters of the First Viscount Hardinge of Lahore to Lady Hardinge and Sir Walter and Lady James, 1844-1847*.

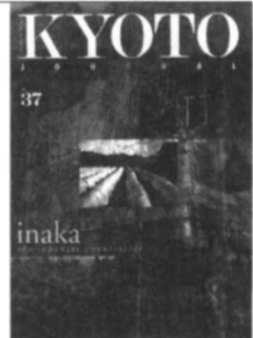
