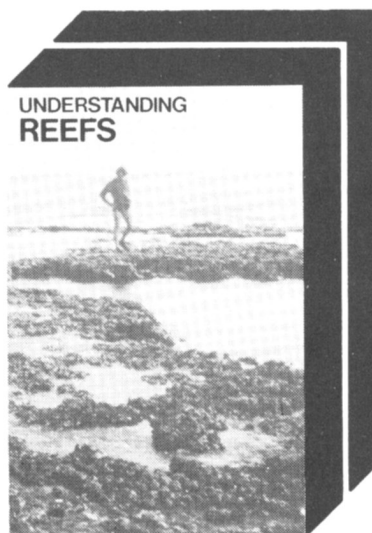

UNDERSTANDING REEFS: A Field Course on Film

These films are concerned with corals and coral reefs. Using the scleractinian corals as the focal point it conveys the intimate relationship between the ecosystem and the rigours with which it must contend. It shows the daily stresses that the individual members of the community face in their day to day lives in their respective habitats. This enables the viewer to comprehend the impact of stress on the ecosystem and its consequences on the development and conservation of reef communities.
