

ANNOUNCING the premier volume of a new annual publication from the National Bureau of Economic Research. It provides a review of issues in the current tax debate, focusing on questions of revenue raising as opposed to tax reform.

The six studies included in this volume were initially presented at a conference held in Cambridge, MA, in November 1986. Written in a non-technical style accessible to policymakers, corporate managers, and lawyers as well as economists, each article demonstrates how economic research can make an important contribution to tax policy debates.

First, Alan Auerbach and James Poterba examine the striking decline in corporate tax revenues as a share of GNP. Next John Shoven analyzes how the recent increase in share repurchases and mergers helps corporate shareholders escape the double taxation of dividends.

Herman Leonard and Richard Zeckhauser review the experience of several state tax amnesty programs and discuss the likely results of a similar program at the federal level. Jeffrey Harris explores the effect of tobacco taxes on the cigarette market and their ultimate impact on health.

Douglas Bernheim's study on the federal estate tax suggests that this tax may actually result in reduced tax revenues. The final article by Michael Boskin and Douglas Puffert shows that the redistributions between married and single workers in the Social Security system dwarf the "marriage tax" effects of the individual income tax.
