### New appointments

Dr Digby Tantam, currently Senior Lecturer in the Department of Psychiatry, University of Manchester, has recently been appointed Professor of Psychotherapy at the University of Warwick and Honorary Consultant Psychotherapist at Walsgrave Hospital, Coventry. This is a new Chair in Psychotherapy, the first ever in England and Wales.

Peter Searle has been appointed Director-General of the Mental Health Foundation, the UK's leading mental health research and community care charity. He was previously Executive Director of World Vision of Britain, the Third World relief and development agency.

### Psychoanalytic Studies Centre

The University of Kent plans to open a Psychoanalytic Studies Centre in October 1990 for the organisation and administration of the teaching programme in psychoanalytic studies, as well as the planning of an extensive research programme. The Centre will be housed in Eliot College but it is hoped funds will be raised for a separate building. The incorporation of a library and archive is also planned. ### Awards

The Kurt Schneider Award, sponsored by Janssen GmbH for exceptional scientific achievements and endowed with DM 10,000 will be awarded for the fourth time in 1991. Its aim is to encourage psychiatric research, particularly in the field of the schizophrenias.

Entry papers must be in either German or English and must be received by 28 February 1991. All entries (seven copies) should be sent to Professor Huber at the address below.

The Hans Jörg Weitbrecht Award, sponsored by Troponwerke Cologne and endowed with DM 10,000, aims to further scientific biological-clinical research in the field of endogenous psychoses. It will be awarded, together with a Hans Jörg Weitbrecht Medal, for the third time primarily to investigators from German-speaking countries. The aim of the prize is to mark exceptional scientific

achievements in psychiatric research, especially in the field of cyclo-thymic and schizophrenic disorders.

Entry papers must be in either German or English (seven copies) and should be sent to the chairman of the board of trustees, Professor Dr Gerd Huber, Univ.-Nervenklinik, D-5300 Bonn 1, Germany, by 31 October 1990.

### Mentally ill people and homelessness

Newcastle is to be one of the first cities in Britain to attempt to produce a strategy to deal with the growing problem of homeless mentally ill people. The group behind the initiative is the Voluntary Organisations Advisory Group (VolsAG) to Newcastle Mental Health Unit (which includes MIND, the Cyrenians and Single Homeless on Tyneside). A symposium was held on 3 April at which Lawrence Conway of Newcastle Mental Health Unit presented the results of his research into this issue. He said that his research supported findings from studies carried out elsewhere which demonstrated that mentally ill people make up a third of homeless people. It is hoped the symposium will begin the process of eradicating this problem in Newcastle.
