

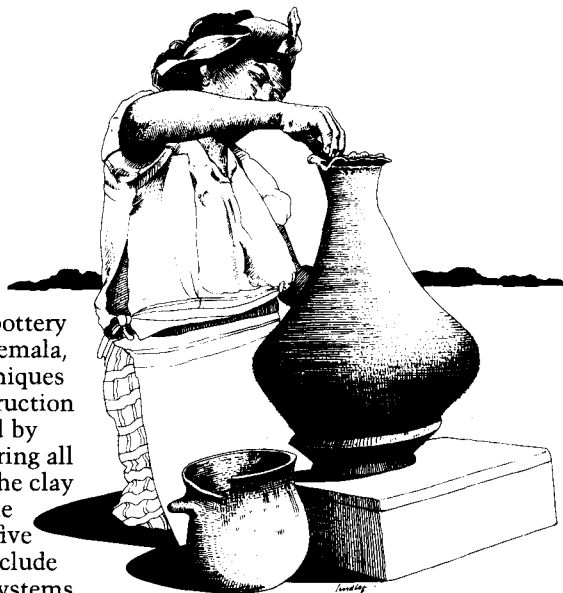

By Christopher B. Donnan and Carol J. Mackey



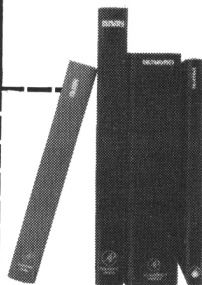
