CONTRIBUTORS

Nicolás Alejandro González Quintero is a Post-Doctoral Fellow in the History Department of the University of São Paulo, with a fellowship from the Fundação de Amparo à Pesquisa do Estado de São Paulo (FAPESP). He has a PhD in History from the University of Texas at Austin, and he was a postdoctoral fellow at the Institute for Historical Studies at the same university. He is an Affiliated Scholar of the Atlantic Exiles Project of the University of Tübingen and a member of Lab-Mundi, a research group on global history based at the University of São Paulo. He has received fellowships from the Huntington Library, Casa de Vélasquez, and the University of Texas at Austin. He has published peer-review articles in *World History Connected*, *Anuario Colombiano de Historia Social y de la Cultura*, and *Historia Crítica*.

Sabrina Smith is Assistant Professor of History and Critical Race and Ethnic Studies at the University of California, Merced. She specializes in the history of the African Diaspora as it extended into Mexico and Central America. She is the author of “Juana Ramírez, Eighteenth-Century Oaxaca, New Spain (Mexico),” in *As If She Were Free: A Collective Biography of Women and Emancipation in the Americas* (2020) and “Slave Trading in Antequera and Interregional Slave Traffic in New Spain, 1680–1710” in *From the Galleons to the Highlands: Slave Trade Routes in the Spanish Americas* (2020). She is working on her first book manuscript, on African-descended women and men in colonial Oaxaca.

Eric Zolov is Professor of Latin American History at Stony Brook University. He has a dual MA in Latin American Studies/International Relations and a PhD in History from the University of Chicago, where he worked closely with John Coatsworth (see interview in this issue). His books include *The Walls of Santiago: Social Revolution and Political Aesthetics in Contemporary Chile* (2022), *The Last Good Neighbor: Mexico in the Global Sixties* (2020), and *Refried Elvis: The Rise of the Mexican Counterculture* (1999). He is former Senior Editor of *The Americas* (2008–14) and has published widely on popular culture, twentieth-century Mexico, and US-Latin American relations.

Paul Gootenberg is SUNY Distinguished Professor of History & Sociology at Stony Brook University in New York. He studied as a Latin Americanist under

John Coatsworth at the University of Chicago from 1978 to 1985, when he received a PhD. During the first decade of his career, he published on the economic and social history of nineteenth-century Peru, and then turned his focus to the global history of drugs. His works in that field include *Andean Cocaine: The Making of a Global Drug* (2008), *Cocaine: Global Histories* (1999), and, with Liliana M. Dávalos, *The Origins of Cocaine: Peasant Colonization and Failed Development in the Amazon Andes* (2018). Gootenberg was General Editor of *The Oxford Handbook of Global Drug History* (2022) and 2021-23 president of the Alcohol and Drugs History Society (ADHS).

Robert H. Holden is Professor of Latin American History at Old Dominion University. He edited *The Oxford Handbook of Central American History* (2022).
