COVER PICTURE		A memorial cross near the former Russian meteorological station at Tikhaya Bukhta. The cross commemorates the North Polar expedition led by Georgiy Sedov, which, 85 years ago, wintered nearby on Hooker Island, Franz Josef Land. Sedov left the camp in February 1914 to head north, but died two miles short of Rudolf Island.
