Daniel Hechstetter was the second surviving son of Daniel Hoechstetter of Augsburg. The father had founded an up-to-date copper industry in Cumbria during the 1560s; Daniel the younger took over the joint direction of that in 1601 with his elder brother and continued in 1615 with his nephew. His voluminous 'Notebook' contains much technical, economic and personal detail until 1637; a smaller booklet carries copies of correspondence and registers of it for about four of these years. These are supplemented by a slightly earlier inventory of the works. The introduction outlines the history of the Cumbrian copper industry and of the English branch of the family between the sixteenth and the eighteenth centuries. Overall the sources provide an exceptionally detailed and comprehensive account of the first English copper industry during the early seventeenth century.
