PURPOSE AND ORGANIZATION

In 1977, a Council of Conferences was established as a liaison with eight regional conferences throughout the United States to serve the needs of those interested in Asian studies in different parts of the country. The Association is a member of the American Council of Learned Societies and the National Council of Area Studies Associations, actively participating with its sister societies in a wide range of activities, including joint participation in research and informational exchanges.

Publications of the Association include *The Journal of Asian Studies*, the *Bibliography of Asian Studies*, *Doctoral Dissertations on Asia*, the *Asian Studies Newsletter*, the *Monograph Series*, and committee publications.
