For all other use, permission should be sought from the Cambridge or New York offices of the Cambridge University Press. that their manuscripts conform to the standards laid down in the LSA Style Sheet (printed periodically in the LSA Bulletin), except in the following respects:

(a) Footnotes should as far as possible be avoided; they should not contain special symbols such as those used in the International Phonetic Alphabet.

(b) Phonetic transcriptions should, wherever possible, make use of the symbols and conventions of the International Phonetic Alphabet, and should be no 'narrower' than is absolutely necessary for the purpose.

(c) Bibliographical references at the end of each article or review should conform to the following models:

The following requirements of the LSA Style Sheet which will apply to manuscripts intended for publication in the *Journal of Linguistics* should be particularly noted:

I. All copy must be double-spaced throughout, and margins of at least $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches should be left on all four sides of each sheet (LSA style sheet, sections I(c) and (d)).

2. Tables, charts and diagrams (though not simple rules, examples or formulae) must each appear on a separate sheet, and must be labelled 'Fig. 2', 'Table 4' or the like as appropriate. References in the text to the table or diagram must be made by citing this label, and not in such terms as 'in the diagram following' (LSA style sheet, sections 1(e) and 10(c)).

3. Typescripts of articles should be submitted in three copies, typescripts of reviews in two copies. Typescripts will not be returned unless postage is provided by contributors (LSA style sheet, section I(g)).
