Diplomacy in Ancient Greece

SIR FRANK ADCOCK AND D. J. MOSLEY

Professor Sir Frank Adcock, from whom this book was originally commissioned, died leaving only a part of the manuscript in draft. Subsequently, Dr D. J. Mosley, Senior Lecturer in Ancient History and Classics at the University of Sheffield, was invited to write the text, incorporating Sir Frank's material, with which he was already familiar.

Dr Mosley discusses in depth diplomatic theory and practice in the ancient Greek world, showing how intense was the behind-the-scenes activity that predetermined or followed events recorded by the writers of classical antiquity. The rival aims of Athens and Sparta with their allies and vassal states, of Thebes and of the ambitious Macedonian rulers Philip and Alexander the Great are seen in a new light as a result of the author's keen scrutiny and assessment of the documentary evidence. So, too, is the thinking that determined Greek strategy in the struggle against outside enemies such as Persia, and, ultimately, Rome. The book is divided into two parts: the first follows closely the chronological sequence of historical events and diplomatic combinations, the second examines the records and practices of Greek diplomacy and analyses its aims, methods, institutions and instruments. There is an appendix setting out a number of relevant documents in translation.

Houses, Villas and Palaces in the Roman World

A. G. MCKAY

Professor McKay examines the enterprise and energies of architects and builders throughout the Roman Empire, from Britain to Mesopotamia, from Germany to North Africa. Simple house forms, mansions, estates and palatial buildings are studied in the light of recent excavations and contemporary scholarship, and stress is laid on the accounts by ancient writers of house designs, interiors, furnishings and gardens. Rome's innovational high-rise apartments, her compact civic squares, grandiose public buildings and temples, shopping centres and commercial blocks are remarkable for their modernity. Two chapters are devoted to the manifold aspects and conditions of life in the Roman provinces, where new discoveries and recent research have shed fresh light on men's needs and accomplishment in private and community living. Extensive bibliographies and detailed notes introduce the reader to larger perspectives and to important archaeological reports.

Utopias of the Classical World


JOHN FERGUSON

This is the first systematic survey of Utopianism as it was elaborated in classical thought, and one that explores familiar highways and unfamiliar byways alike. Starting with Homer and a discussion of the early Utopias, of which little is known, the author moves on to the towering figure of Plato and then to the great period of Utopian construction in the first century of the Hellenistic age. After a look at Jewish Messianism, he shows how Greek and Jewish thought came together and were absorbed in the Romano-Christian tradition; and he concludes with a short commentary on St Augustine's *The City of God*. Of special interest in this work of exemplary scholarship is the author's analysis of the impact of Utopian thought on practical politics.

Professor Ferguson is Dean and Director of Studies in Arts at the Open University.

Volume 2 The Archaic Period

This second of twelve volumes is even more magnificent than Volume 1, *Prehistory and Protohistory* which was published last June. It covers the period 1100 to 479 B.C., taking in the whole of the Persian Wars with the major battles graphically represented in text diagrams and pictures.

In the arts the book chronicles the development of literature—Homer, Hesiod, Pindar and the great dramatists; the work of the pre-Socratic philosophers; advances in medicine; and the establishment of the Olympic Games. A most attractive section illustrates the social and domestic life of the period—cooking, washing, hairdressing, swimming, pets, music-making and many other aspects of day-to-day life which often seem astonishingly up-to-date.

This superb piece of Hellenic scholarship has again been translated into English by a team directed by Dr. Phillip Sherrard of King's College, London.
