By WALTER MCKENZIE PINTNER. This is the first study to deal exclusively with Russian economic policy and its contribution to the decline of Russian influence before the Crimean War. Drawing upon unpublished documents in Soviet archives, Professor Pintner unravels the complicated reasons for the failure of Nicholas's policies: bureaucratic complacency, the ignorance and apathy of the people, and the peculiar mixture of realism and timidity that characterized his efforts.

By THORNTON ANDERSON. In this lucid and fully documented appraisal of Russian political theory and practice, the author stresses the *continuity* as well as the evolution of ideas. He examines the present Soviet regime not simply in terms of its Marxist-Leninist concepts, but as a development of traditional Russian political assumptions. He shows how Orthodoxy, Mongol invasions, the fall of Byzantium, and even attempts at Westernization under Peter and Catherine led to the present isolation of Russia from the West.
